#### LETTER FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR



Dear partners, donors, staff and clients:

This past year has reminded me how vital compassion, love, connection, and harm reduction are in the face of brutal challenges. In the Parkdale neighborhood and across Toronto, community members continue to navigate a toxic drug supply, service disruptions, no affordable housing, and widening inequities. Yet every day, we witnessed remarkable resilience—from the people that we serve, our staff, and the many partners who make this work possible.

This year, our team supported 865 registered clients and 4,452 anonymous clients through harm reduction supply provision, case management, outreach, counselling, supportive housing, and community programming. These touchpoints reflect deep need, and more importantly - deep trust. Every connection reminds us why harm reduction remains an essential, evidence-based public health practice, rooted in compassion and respect.

Amid the closures of several safe consumption sites and increasing pressures on harm reduction infrastructure province-wide, our teams showed profound leadership. Breakaway staff organized, advocated, and gathered with community for events such as Community Solidarity Day, where kindness, grief, and resistance met in equal measure. These moments remind us that our work is not only about services—it is about belonging, justice, and human rights.

We also invested in ourselves. Staff Planning Days brought our entire organization together to reflect and strengthen the ways we work, resulting in tangible improvements across programs and operations. Our client advisory committee advocated for us to prioritize opportunities for social connection through arts, and skill-based groups—from photography and ceramics to book clubs and crochet—offering clients joy, creativity, and community alongside care.

Through it all, our donors and partners played an essential role. Your generosity allowed us to sustain and grow services, respond quickly to community needs, and remain a stabilizing force during extremely challenging times. Thank you for standing with us, believing in harm reduction, and investing in care that saves lives.

As we look ahead, we hold both urgency and optimism. The challenges facing Toronto—housing precarity, toxic drug supply, systemic inequities—are not small. But neither is the strength of our community. Breakaway will continue to advocate for safe, compassionate, and effective harm reduction; to build collaborative and culturally safe services; and to ensure that every person we serve is met with respect and possibility.

Thank you for walking alongside us during this deeply challenging year. Thank you for believing in harm reduction, in community, and in the futures our clients deserve. Together, we will keep moving forward—with courage, with love, and with hope.


#### Did you know?

### SATELLITE OPIOID TREATMENT AND HARM REDUCTION OUTREACH

The Satellite Opioid Treatment and Harm Reduction Outreach program provides comprehensive primary care and nursing services to clients, offering opioid agonist treatment (OAT) to prevent withdrawal and reduce cravings from opioid drugs.

The Satellite Opioid Treatment and Harm Reduction Outreach program also offers counselling, case management, health education, peer support, and off-site harm reduction services for all types of substance use.

#### **FAMILY AND YOUTH INITIATIVE (FYI)**

FYI is one of the only harm reduction based substance use services for families and youth in Toronto. Our outpatient program offers assessments, individual & family therapy, and community and school outreach and education to help youth and their families build tools to achieve healthier outcomes.

#### **TORONTO OPIATE SUPPORT TEAM (TOST)**

TOST is an outreach team that operates within Toronto, reducing barriers to support by engaging with and advocating for clients, with a focus on youth, seniors, and women using opioids. Our services include case management, counselling, and service provider training.

#### **ADDICTION SUPPORTIVE HOUSING (ASH)**

Breakaway is partnered with CommunitiCare (formally Regeneration Community Services) to offer supportive housing to individuals. This Housing First approach stabilizes clients, increases uptake of services (e.g. addiction treatment), and builds the foundations for achieving long-term goals (e.g. stable housing and stable employment).

#### THROUGH RUFF TIMES (TRT)

Many clients are forced to choose between their health and their ability to care for their furry family members-often their only family. TRT offers temporary pet care that allow clients to take up health services such as medical operations and addiction treatments, enabling preventative care and reducing load on public services when conditions worsen. TRT also offers a pet food bank and pet-related grief and loss support.

#### **PIECES TO PATHWAYS (P2P)**



P2P assembling kits

P2P was Canada's first harm reduction service designed specifically for LGBTQ2S+ youth, a still marginalized group. Delivered by queer and trans staff with lived experience of substance use and recovery, P2P offers case management, skills building, and community groups, as well as harm reduction training for other organizations.

#### **GRIEF, LOSS, & WELLNESS (GLOW)**

GLoW is a unique program that supports frontline workers who are overwhelmingly impacted by trauma and loss driven by Canada's opioid and overdose crisis. Often, these workers are contract staff and lack access to benefits - GLoW steps into provide one-to-one and peer supports that protect workers and allow them to stay in the field, as well as training for organizations to better care for their workers.




